Create Your Own Executive Search Service

Now there's a way to customize THE SOURCE to your own interests and needs . . . a way to go direct from signon *automatically* to the information you specify, without making a single keystroke.

You can create your own executive search service, for example, to check your mailbox; review your stock portfolio for the latest quotes; check gold prices; scan business briefs; take a look at the latest football scores; even sign you off automatically.

What's more, it's easy to use — and saves you time and money by taking you direct to the information you need to check everyday.

Here's how to customize THE SOURCE.

Say you want to check your mailbox for unread mail, see the latest quotes on

your stocks, and scan the most current listings in POST bulletin board under the IBM category. And you want this information displayed for you automatically every time you sign on.

First — and most important — you must go through the services manually, one by one, and write down every command, or every key you pressed (including RETURN) each time the system prompts you. This is because, when you enter the commands to create your search file, you must also enter — one per line — every keystroke you would normally make.

Once you have this list, you are ready to create your search file. Just follow the steps outlined in the example chart.

Now sign back on to THE SOURCE — and the information will be displayed for you automatically. This will now happen every time you sign on — until you choose to delete or change your file. (You can quickly see what's in your

current search file by typing TY SID at Command Level. To delete your search file, just type DEL SID at Command Level and enter a new one by following the instructions listed here.)

All About Telecommunications Networks— Important News for Tymnet Users

To connect your equipment with the computers of THE SOURCE in McLean, Virginia, you need to dial — usually with a local call — into a telecommunications network.

Telecommunications networks are independent companies serving the communications needs of many services, including THE SOURCE.

THE SOURCE currently leases communications lines from three such networks — Telenet, Tymnet and Uninet — for use by its members. In addition, last year STC began to establish SOURCENET — our own telecommunications network — currently available in Chicago, the New York metropolitan area, Philadelphia and Pleasantville/White Plains, New York. We are working to expand SOURCENET into other major metropolitan areas as early as possible.

The cost of using any of these networks is included in your hourly usage fee for THE SOURCE. In many areas of the country, more than one network is available to you; other areas may be served by only one network

As telecommunications costs continue to rise, STC is committed to finding ways to *hold down* telecommunications costs however possible.

Consequently, effective April 1, 1984, Tymnet service to THE SOURCE will be discontinued.

If you currently use the Tymnet telecommunications network to access THE SOURCE, you may continue to do so until March 31, 1984. But you will want to begin using an alternate network as soon as possible — there's no additional cost nor inconvenience to you.

To see what other networks are available in your area, type ACCESS at Command Level. There you can look up alternative Telenet, Uninet or SOURCENET telephone numbers by city, state or area code.

Sign-on instructions for these networks are available there, or in the *Sign-On!* pamphlet, available free by sending a SourceMail request to TCA#68.

Also, see the back page of this issue of SOURCEWORLD for Telenet sign-on instructions.

We are working hard to have local Telenet and Uninet numbers installed in areas served by Tymnet only — please continue to refer to ACCESS online for regular updates.

We will continue to hold down costs . . . and explore alternative networks . . . while increasing our ability to deliver a reliable and economically-priced service to you.

You send and receive messages in your SourceMailbox, where your messages remain unopened until you're ready . . . Plus, you can send the same message to an entire group of people — up to 1,000 names! - Chat, live member-to-member electronic conversation. Try a "blind" Chat. Just type ONLINE at Command Level for a listing of other members currently using THE SOURCE. Choose an ID, and then from Command Level type CHAT, a space and the other person's ID. Enter a brief greeting, pressing RETURN a few times after each comment. You'll be surprised at how quickly you'll develop a collection of interesting electronic "pen pals" worldwide.
- Join a PARTI Electure (See the article on the front page of this issue.) Or, join one of the many lively PARTI conferences on topics ranging from politics to families and computing. Type PARTI at Command Level for details.
- Browse through the online bulletin board POST. You'll find over 80 categories — everything from a personals column to categories for all types of personal computers.
 Swap news . . . buy and sell goods and services . . . trade information with other members, even post listings of your own in this dynamic electronic gathering spot.

Signing-On through Telenet

If you currently use Tymnet to access THE SOURCE, you may continue to do so until March 31, 1984, at which time Tymnet will be discontinued. (See Straight From THE SOURCE, this issue.)

If you use TYMNET, please begin to familiarize yourself with an alternative network, such as Telenet. Check ACCESS online to see which networks are available in your area.

Here are the sign-on procedures for Telenet — next issue we'll take a look at the Uninet network

After you dial the Telenet number, you will hear a high-pitched tone. If you are using a separate modem, be sure to follow the instructions on your modem when inserting your telephone. After the ready light appears:

*Terminal Identifier codes are the brief codes that tell Telenet what kind of terminal or personal computer you are using. In most cases, the code of time work However, for a few special equipment types, a different code is needed. See your Sign-On pamphlet or User's Manual for a listing.

"Error Messages"... When To Call Telenet

Occasionally when attempting to sign-on to THE SOURCE via Telenet, you may receive an "error message" generated by Telenet. If you receive one of these messages, hang up and try again in a few minutes. If after another attempt you still cannot connect to THE SOURCE, call Telenet at (800) 336-0437. (In Virginia, (800) 572-0408 and (703) 442-2200 outside the continental U.S.)

<address>*BUSY

All computer ports are in use. Try again in a few minutes. If this condition persists, call TELENET.

<address>NOT OPERATING, NOT RESPONDING, OR NOT AVAILABLE

Your computer is not acknowledging your request. Call Telenet immediately.

<address>ILLEGAL ADDRESS
Call Telenet immediately.

<address>REJECTING

Call THE SOURCE Customer Support. (703) 734-7540.

<address>NOT REACHABLE

Indicates a temporary network problem. Try again in 5 minutes.

STILL PENDING

Telenet is still attempting to establish your connection. If you wish to cancel your request, enter a D to disconnect.

POSSIBLE DATA LOSS

The network has reset your connection. Check for data loss. If this message persists, notify TELENET.

LOCAL NETWORK OUTAGE

Indicates a temporary network problem. Re-establish your connection. If condition persists, call TELENET.

STILL CONNECTED

You are still connected to your computer. If you wish to resume your session, enter the CONTINUE command.

DISCONNECTED

This message normally appears when you have logged off your computer or when you have entered the Telenet command D to disconnect. If it appears by itself, it indicates your connection has been reset due to a problem; re-establish your connection.

NOT CONNECTED

Response to Telenet CONTINUE command when a connection has not been established.

RING/NO ANSWER, TONE/NO RESPONSE, OR PHONE BUSY Call Telenet immediately.
