PC-FILE III & YOUR RACORE DRIVE 2

While looking over some publications, I came across a catalog from the "Pcjr Group" in Lubbock, Texas. It contained a letter from Gary West of Allendale, SC in which described how to install PC-FILE III onto a RAM disk. As many of us have expanded our Junior's memory and drive capability, it may be beneficial for some if we recapped Mr. West's article. Many of us have purchased copies of PC-FILE to evaluate and have found the program useful. If you have hesitated registering your copy because you have found it to be somewhat slow in its operation, this may just change your mind about PC-FILE.

If Mr. West will pardon our paraphrasing him, we'll repeat for you here how he installed PC-FILE onto a RAM disk. We have made some changes to his procedures and updated them to install version 4.0. Make a copy of the PC-FILE III diskette that you purchased from the Eugene PCjr Club using DISKCOPY. Place your original copy in a safe place and use this working copy for all of the below procedures.

Using DOS, format a new diskette using the FORMAT/S command which will create a self-booting disk. Place this newly formatted diskette in your B: drive and your working copy of PC-FILE in the A: drive. At the A>, type COPY \*.\* B: <enter>. All of the files from A: will be transferred to B: with the exception of PCFILE.XXX. This file won't be transferred because of insufficient disk space, but when the diskette in B: drive is full, the copy process will stop.

Remove the working copy of PC-FILE from the A: drive and put it away. Place the copy from drive B:, which we will call the RAM copy, into drive A: and type PCSETUP <enter>. Follow setup procedures as they appear on your screen. When you have done this, you can erase several files from this newly-made RAM diskette that you no longer need. At the A>, type the following commands: ERASE README <enter>; ERASE RESPONSE <enter>; ERASE ERASE PCSETUP.EXE <enter>; and PCDOC.EXE <enter>. These files are still on both your original and working copies of PC-FILE III.

With the new RAM copy of PC-FILE III still in A: drive, type the following command: COPY CON A: CONFIG.SYS and press <enter>.

Next, type DEVICE=JRVIDEO.COM <enter> and then, DEVICE=MDISK.COM / 256 <enter>. (Note the space between .COM and / 256).

After you have done this, press the  $\langle Fn \rangle$  key and the  $\langle 6 \rangle$  key, which will create the end-of-file character  $(\frac{1}{4}Z)$  and press  $\langle enter \rangle$ . You have now created a 256K RAM disk.

Now, using the procedures on page 2-15 of your DOS 2.1 manual, at the A> type the following: COPY CON A:AUTOEXEC.BAT and press <enter>. Next, type the following, pressing the <enter> key after each line:

PCVIDEO
POW2CLK
COPY A:PC\*.\* C:
C:
PC-FILE
A:

Now, press the <'hn> and <6> keys to create the end-of-file character (½Z) and press <enter>.

It is now necessary for you to place your RACORE systems disk in drive B:, type B: <enter>, and at the B> type the following commands with an <enter> after each line:

COPY JRVIDEO.COM A: COPY MDISK.COM A: COPY PCVIDEO.COM A: COPY POW2CLK.EXE A:

Remove the RACORE disk from B: drive and place it in a safe place. Press Ctrl, Alt, Delete to reboot your Junior and watch it work!

I understand that one of our members has a much shorter method of making the AUTOEXEC.BAT file for PC-FILE and the RAM drive for use with the RACORE Drive Two with DMA> We hope to get him to write an article telling us what the difference is in the two RACORE systems, the shorter method for the RAM disk, and possibly give us a demo of it soon.

### RAM DISKS, THEIR USES & EXAMPLES

At this month's meeting, I will be giving a talk on RAM disks, their uses, and examples. Due to the differences between each RAM disk setup procedure, I will only talk specifically about my own.

There are quite a few variations of RAM disk utilities available today. Most memory boards come with one, and DOS 3.0 has one. They all perform the same function, but unfortunately are all set up differently.

I have an Impulse Memory Board that was bundled with some free software. Included was, of course, a RAM disk utility. I will include here the READ ME file from that disk:

IMPDISK.SYS is a very flexible RAM disk designed to permit you to utilize part of your IMPULSE 100 extra memory as a diskette. When IMPDISK.SYS is run, it creates a RAM disk as drive C, which has a "disk size" that you specify.

To use IMPDISK.SYS, you must create a CONFIG.SYS file which "calls out" or "recognizes" IMPDISK.SYS; or, if you currently have a CONFIG.SYS file on your diskette, you must add IMPDISK.SYS to it. To create a CONFIG.SYS file that recognizes IMPDISK.SYS, type the following:

A> COPY CON:CONFIG.SYS <enter>
DEVICE=IMPDISK.SYS #64 <enter>
Fn 6 <enter>

The above sequence creates a RAM disk with 64K of memory. For other sizes of RAM disk, just change the size of the number following the #.

IMPDISK.SYS will only create a RAM disk when used with a PCjr which has an IMPULSE 100 unit with or without additional memory. Additionally, you must run EXTRARAM.EXE as described in the IMPULSE 100 manual to position the video memory for proper usage of IMPDISK.SYS.

A CONFIG.SYS file is provided on the enclosed diskette which calls out a 64K RAM disk. Remember, you must have a CONFIG.SYS file which calls out IMPDISK.SYS as well as the file IMPDISK.SYS all on your system disk.

Each manufacturer will include documentation in one form or another to facilitate the RAM disk set up. The above documentation will work only with the RAM disk utility provided from Impulse. Come to the meeting and I will give some examples of how I use my Ram disk. See you then. — Bruce Bayne

## FROM THE DISK LIBRARIAN

The Library has many utility disks. They are:

- #11 27 DOS Utilities.
- #12 DOS Utilities/Screen Editor.
- #13 DOS Utilities/Additional Misc.
- #17 Keyboard Utilities.
- #21 Sundry DOS Utilities.
- #22 Copy and Delete Utilities.
- #23 Nelist, Superdir, Dumpscrn Utilities.
- #26 Utilities.
- #27 Disk Utilities.
- #28 Top Utilities.
- #29 Utilities.

This means that over 20% of the Disk Library is made up of utilities, yet very few of the membership seems to have any interest in them.

There are many reasons why these disks are remaining dormant. We have identified some of the files that do not work well (or not at all), and those that are not much use unless you are using single sided disks and DOS 1.1. But we feel that the real reason there is so little interest in these utility disks is that many people do not know what they are or how to use them.

There are far too many programs to list in the Librarian's Column, so what we hope to do is to begin with a couple of them each month. We hope to give them a short write-up and then demonstrate them at each meeting. What I would like to see is someone who is actually using these disks to do the write-ups and the demos as we all know that the Librarian has skills in maintaining the Library and not in running his computer! (Not so, at all, Louie. You are indeed the best kind of computer user; concerned, eager to learn, quickminded, and willing to share your skills and knowledge. - ED-).

So, this is a warning. If that knowledgeable person does not come forward, this column may get to be pretty funny. The demos at the meeting may become show-and-tells.

But to move on, time is running out (actually, the time has come and gone) for those of you in the "Adopt-A-Disk" program. It is time to get your notes to Paddy and reserve a slot at a meeting to run the program...if it will run.

Disk #40, CARD GAMES, is becoming one of the top disks in the Library. Mary Burich has been working on this disk and it is now very "user friendly". All of the programs are in BASIC, so you do need the BASIC Cartridge in your Junior, or some form of disk BASIC. It also has good documentation on the disk. CARD GAMES is now a quality disk and is very popular. — Louie Levy —

# NEWS FROM THE DISK LIBRARY

It's great to have our Disk Librarian and Refreshments Coordinator back with us again after an all-too-long vacation! Louie and Elleen Levy were certainly missed. Welcome home!

This month's featured disk from our Disk Library is E-Z UTILITIES. The disk is packed with 25 small utilities which are practical, easy-to-learn exceptionally well-documented. If you've never used utilities before, This is the perfect starter disk. And, if you've never used a utility, you're doing certain operations the hard way and could probably use several of the programs we've included on this disk. E-Z UTILITIES addresses many features of Junior's operation which are tedious if not downright frustrating. -> P9 7

If you're tired of hammering in the same series of DOS commands time after time, you'll like DOS-EDIT. It's much more versatile than DOS' Fn-l and Fn-3 repeat keys. And, if you'd like a handy insert for each of your disks listing the disk's title, contents and free space, check out COVER.

Some of us don't want the hassle of a full-size printer enhances such as PC-FONT or FONTMENU. EPSET gives you the same features of the larger programs but uses far less memory. This may be important if you're short on K power. EPSET, like all the programs on E-Z UTILITIES, is simple. No hassles, no headaches with this or any other program on the disk.

Also on this disk is COLOR, the best DOS screen color selection utility I've ever used. Choose from 255 different screen color combinations right from the DOS prompt. No need to settle for the same ol' boring white on black screen in DOS. And, with the LABEL utility, you'll have the features of DOS 3.0 that you probably wish had been included in earlier versions of DOS. LABEL allows you to give any disk a volume label after you've formatted the disk or change a disk volume label any time you choose. A good number of us still forget the /V option when formatting.

Once you've tried SDIR and LIST, you'll begin to use DIR and TYPE less and less. SDIR is an enhanced directory lister and LIST is similar but clearly superior to TYPE. With LIST, you can SCROLL UP AND DOWN any text file and print the file quickly as you page through it. SDIR and LIST are two of the most popular, most highly acclaimed utilities in use across the country.

E-Z UTILITIES also includes a variable-size printer spooler, a program to indicate the status of the CAPS LOCK key, a short utility to correct the "DEVICE TIMEOUT" error when the printer is taken off line while printing, utilities to squeeze and unsqueeze files, a program to make a file read-only, and a short program to make a read-only file copyable.

E-Z UTILITIES is a five-star disk and I recommend it for both the novice and the advanced user. It's well worth the five dollars. Yes, even I'd spend the money on it.

# LCC's MICROCOMPUTER CLASSES

Here is a brief summary of the classes I will offer this Fall Term through the LCC Business Department.

Computerization of the Small Business -- Monday, Wednesday, Friday 0800 in the morning. This class is intended for businessperson who has little knowledge of computers (or those who need more) and wants a "battle plan" on what to do and how to do it. The class will discuss computer concepts enough to be able to talk about computers. It features lots of check lists for determining the firm's needs and making the best purchase.

The other new class: DBASE III+.
There will be two classes,
probably Monday and Wednesday
evenings. Check with LCC.

DBASE III is a very powerful database program. It principally a DB program rather than an integrated one like the Lotus 123 that was demonstrated at the August meeting. We will consider how the program works, templates business and applications. Lots of hands-on in the lab is expected with this program. No outside homework is expected as the program disks cannot be removed from lab. Uses of DB III include sets of records, manipulation, sorts, and much more.

Bring your textbooks and two disks (DSDD). Program disks will be furnished. The class is in the Business Bldg, room 202. It is an IBM PC lab. BCNU. - Jim Cox
