"HANDS ON" CLASSES FOR CLUB MEMBERS

Our regular monthly Club meetings provide software (programs) overviews as part of the regular evening session. There will be additional evening or weekend opportunities using some of these specific programs to provide a "hands on" experience for members. By registering and participating in workshops of their interest, Club members will be able to add to their skill levels. The specific Club meeting demonstration concerning that month's workshop will make it very clear as to what the focus of the workshop will be. Members may sign up ahead of time at one of our meetings on the "WORKSHOP BOARD", or by calling Phil (343-1059) and indicating that you would like to have your name added to a specific workshop.

There will be a \$6 non-refundable registration fee per one-session workshop or an \$8 fee for a two-session workshop for each participant. The fee reserves a working place in the workshop, provides the participant with the necessary shareware disks and pays for refreshments during the workshop. The person hosting the workshop will receive the workshop free. . .Anyone interested in "hosting" and "learning" at the same time? Hosting does not imply responsibility for teaching the workshop, the host only provides a place, along with some refreshments, for the instructional gathering.

The thrust of these workshops is to provide opportunities for interested Club members to receive help in actually learning how to make better use of their PCjr. Club membership is only \$20 per year and includes all family members.

Banking on Junior

Well, it's finally here. The future we have read about where all the ordinary tasks we perform can be done by computer has arrived and PCjr is right there working its heart out for you.

I'm speaking of banking by computer. Of course you have to have a bank account with a bank that participates in this kind of program, then you have to have some money in the bank, then you need a modem, (modem settings will be given to you by your bank), and a telephone line, and a software package to use. For software, contact Phil Janz, the trusty help man in the Company Store.

Next you need to tell your bank you wish to participate in this kind of program, and they will furnish you with informational brochures or pamphlets to get you started.

These programs are generally just getting started in banks and so have patience, their programs are not perfect yet.

In case your are wondering just what you can do with this wonderful step into the future, just listen. . . After you get into the system, my bank calls it Personal Branch, you will have to give your account number followed by your personal identification number called PIN. The system is a lot like Clinton—three strikes and you're out—so try to get your account number and PIN right by the third try or you have to start all over.

Once you get into the account, you will get a main menu to select your activity. You may select account histories for both checking accounts and loans. You can tell if a check has been cleared, or a deposit made, or horrors—if there really is any money continued on Page 6 > left in the account. You may get dividend information or loan payoff amounts and maturity dates on all time deposits. If you have a business, you could get a payroll distribution record and tax information. You may transfer funds from one account to another. You may even withdraw funds by check and have it sent to yourself by mail. You may also download information.

Probably banking services by computer vary from one bank to another, so check with your bank to see if they offer this kind of service and if they don't offer it, ask for it.

Did I forget to say that learning to use this process takes patience? But try it, then you too can check your bank account regularly to see if some unexpected funds turn up.

In an editorial in PC World magazine, Editor in Chief Phil Lemmons says that "PC vendors have asked for more timely review now that many models remain on the market only six months or even less." One vendor told Mr. Lemmons that PC World does "a great job on reviews, but by the time your (PC World's) review appears I'll have an allnew product line. There isn't one PC I can sell you that will still be on the market five months from now."

This about says it all for Junior and why IBM "orphaned" it when they did. The quote from Bob Gauthier, while humorous on the surface, is made very true when taken along with what the editor of PC World says. In the game of computer marketing, six months is about it for any product line. After that, you can no longer find it on any dealer's shelf.

Does the fact that a particular model or type of computer is no longer being manufactured make it obsolete? Most Junior owners have proven that they don't buy into this hype. This is the same ploy the automobile industry uses to make us buy a new car every year when the old one is doing just fine.

Still, this doesn't mean that a PCjr owner should <u>never</u> consider buying a newer, faster or larger computer. What it means is that people should look at their individual needs before allowing themselves to be taken in by the "newer is better," "what you have now is obsolete" sales talks by most vendors.

If what you do requires you to use some of the larger computer aided design programs, desk-top publishing software packages, or those programs that only run under Windows and must have a zillion bytes of memory and own their own partition on your gigabyte hard drive, then by all means do some shopping around and make the move.

Just remember that the work you and I are doing everyday is being done on one of those so-called obsolete computers. Also remember that the computer you may buy tomorrow will, like Junior, become obsolete in six months. . . if you believe everything you read!

DOS TIP:

When you key in DISKCOPY A: B: and press enter, we know that Junior will read DISKCOPY.COM from our DOS boot disk in our A Drive and then execute the command. Once the copy process is completed, Junior asks us if we want to make another copy. If we want to make another diskcopy, but inadvertently press "n" for no, we are left with the DOS prompt and will have to start keying in the process all over again. continued on page 7

But, we don't have to rekey the command DISKCOPY A: B:. All we need do is press Fn 3 and Junior will repeat the last DOS command we keyed in. You can try this with the DIR command. Put a disk in your drive and key in DIR and press enter. Now, press Fn 3 and you will see the DIR command repeated.

You can also key in FN 1. This will repeat what you last keyed in one letter at the time. Fn 1, Fn 1 and Fn 1 will repeat DIR. Of course, the right arrow key will do the same... one letter at the time.

Fn 2 isn't used very often, but if you have keyed in a rather long DOS command, you can key in Fn 2 followed by a character from the last DOS command and Junior will repeat the command up to that particular character.

We should all try these, and for that matter, all new tips we read about. Many will not be used, but if we find only a couple useful, they will make our computing much more pleasurable! And that's what it's all about, isn't it?

Trends from (Wow!) Ten Years Ago-

PC WORLD magazine, back in December 1985, focused on trends for the next year and included several graphs. One showed that 288,000 Juniors were

sold in 1984 and that 205,000 Juniors were sold in 1985: a grand total of a lot of IBM PCirs in a two year period!


MAKING jr CLICK Л

You should all be familiar with the key combo Ctrl/Alt/Del to reboot our Juniors, but did you know there are other similar keyboard tricks? The least documented one is the Ctrl/Alt/ CapsLock combination.

Pressing all three keys (Ctrl/Alt /CapsLock) at once produces a quiet clicking sound each time a key is pressed. Some people find this kind of mechanical typewriter sound annoying while others find it a helpful reminder that the key they pressed actually got properly "hit". It also can be useful when children are using the PCjr, as they get a sound to help them realize that pressing a key actually caused something to happen in the computer.

To turn off the click, just press the three keys together again. (This type of key function is known as a "toggle switch key function" because you can toggle it on or off.)

Give it a try. You may find you like it!
