Writing Assistant and Windows 95 and Windows 98

Possibly the most asked question your club gets is "will my old *Writing Assistant* program work on my new computer?" The answer, of course, is a resounding "YES."

Most folks had little to no problems using Writing Assistant with Windows 3.0 and 3.1. The only thing needed was to copy the files to a subdirectory using an original Writing Assistant disk's SETUP program. But, the SETUP programs with the Assistant series of software had its problems. The main drawback was being allowed to use SETUP only five times and no more. Many of us exceeded that even BEFORE Windows came out.

It wasn't all that long ago that many of us began using programs such as *COPYIIPC* or *COPYIIJR* to make copies of our original *Writing Assistant* disk so we could use the SETUP program from these backup copies.

Next came the debug routine that would solve everyone's problem by making the *Writing Assistant* program "copyable." Using a debugged copy allowed us to copy *Writing Assistant* to our hard drive with no effort. We also could use DISKCOPY to make backup copies and even make self-booting *Writing Assistant* disks that allowed us to run our favorite writing program in a RAM drive environment on Junior.

Windows 95 and 98 has created new problems for us. For these operating systems, the Writing Assistant files are copied into a new folder in the Program Files subdirectory. A "shortcut" is made to the file WRITE.EXE and this shortcut is placed on the desktop. Double clicking on the icon runs the Writing Assistant program.

Should that last paragraph sound a little tricky and you feel that you may have trouble doing it, send a self-addressed envelope to the Club's PO Box and we'll get step-by-step instructions to you.

Why in the World Would I Want to Join a Computer Club that's 2000 Miles Away?

A quick answer can come from a search engine like "Ask Jeeves." You could go on-line and key in www.askjeeves.com and do a search for PCjr. If he could, Jeeves would say you should join the Eugene PCjr Club because there are no other PCjr Clubs around. But, this doesn't really get to the meat of the question.

Actually, if your hometown has a computer club you SHOULD join it. All of these clubs have a few tireless, dedicated folks who volunteer their time by answering your questions at each meeting and via telephone.

your "new" computer.

Hands-On BASIC

By joining that computer club "out in Eugene, Oregon" you become a member of a select group. Each member of that group not only owns the old IBM PCjr computer, but most of them are *using* the old IBM PCjr computer! Some of them are using Junior on a daily basis and it is their ONLY computer.

able to make the full resources of Eugene PCjr Club part of your personal knowledge bank. Need a part for your 128K Junior? They have it. Your "brick" quit humming? They have it. A fuse for your Junior monitor? Sure. A copy of *JrTele* for that 300 baud modem? How about a



We all know that one of the projects the club has is to place computers into homes of folks who can really use them, and with this placement, Gordon has made the club's outreach program more of a success.

Still, we need more support from you our membership. We don't have too many jobs or projects, but all of us need to be taking a more active interest if we are going to survive as a viable, helping Junior Club. Here are some ways that YOU can become more involved: If you know of anyone who is using a Junior, tell them about the club and actively

recruit them to join.
If you are doing something with your Junior that you feel would be of interest to others in your club, write a short article about it for the Newsletter.

☞ If you are using a program that is not in our Shareware Library, make a copy and send it to the Club. (Be sure it's Shareware or Freeware, though, and not commercial software.)

If you like to tinker with computers, how about using some of your skills on some Juniors to get them in operating condition so they can be put in the club's outreach project or in the store catalog.



How about trying to get some of those modems we have up and on-line.

Send the Club a list of things you use your Junior for. Many members would use their Juniors for more than just letter writing and email if they knew what (and how) to do it.

Add your name to the NEED HELP? list the club maintains. Now that the Eugene PCjr Club isn't just located in Lane County, we need mentors everywhere who will volunteer their time to help other Junior owners.

If you have a working computer you are no longer using, donate it to someone who can put

it to use. We do that locally, but you can do that whereever you live.

Volunteer your time to help—not only to your club, but help anyone who needs it!

I acquired a PC Enterprises Configuration Plus cartridge but it had no instructions on how to set the switches. Where can I find out this information?

I don't know. Seriously, though, I would first try e-mailing PC Enterprises (webmaster@pcenterprises.com) and see if they would supply you with this information. Also, if you are a member who is reading this and can supply us with this information, how about letting us know and we'll pass it on.

The Configuration Plus cartridge this member asks about is very unique. It has three lights on it that will signal when the Caps Lock is turned on on your keyboard. Two other lights indicate the Scroll Lock and Numbers Lock



Several small DIP switches are also provided that allow the user to set up several options at boot-up. One, the PC/PCjr Identifier Switch, permits the user to set what is known as the "system identification byte" so that software that checks to see if it is being run on a Junior or a PC can be used in the mode that is required. This is especially useful for some of the Sierra-On-Line software that can give the message "will not run on a PCjr."

This switch also will allow you to run "regular" BASIC on your Junior. Doing so will free up one of the two cartridge slots on the front of Junior.

We mentioned the indicator lights that will give you a visual reminder that the Caps Lock, Num Lock or Scroll Lock has been set on the keyboard. If you use *Writing Assistant*, the Scroll Lock can be changed to give you a visual indication if you have Insert or Type Over chosen on your keyboard.

The Configuration Plus cartridge allows the option of starting Junior in either 40 or 80 column mode without software. The same is true for color or black-and-white mode.

Junior users may want to take a look at PC Enterprises Web page, as this cartridge is still available. This is one item that your Club Store seldom has on hand.

While in the Portland Airport, I read about the Eugene PCjr Club in one of the local "throwaway" computer papers that one finds laying around places like that. As we have nothing in our area like that nice informative newspaper, I was wondering if you had any subscription data for it. Unfortunately, I do not remember the name of the paper.

The newspaper you are referring to was undoubtedly "Computer Bits Magazine." We like to think of it as a giveaway newspaper instead of a throwaway, but Computer Bits does offer subscriptions and you can get a copy delivered to your door anywhere in the US by sending a check for \$30 to Subscriptions, Computer Bits, PO Box 329, Forest Grove, OR 97116. EFN Upgrades Service

All of us in the Lane County area have had a close association with Oregon Public Networking for quite some time. Eugene Freenet is the Internet Service Provider that operates under the OPN umbrella and gives free or low cost community access to the Internet.

This past month has seen EFN upgrade their computers and modems to make access to the Internet faster and more reliable for all of us. Well, nearly all of us. The new Portmaster PM3 Access Servers they installed do not

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accept modem speed of less than 2400 baud. What's a poor Junior owner to do? The Club has contacted

EFN's support staff about this and they are doing everything that is possible to provide our

membership with continuing access. Of course, the problem lies with our Juniors and <u>our</u> slow modems; not EFN's.

If you are using a modem with a speed of at least 2400 baud, you will have no problem other than the need to change EFN's access phone number to 762-4321. The old numbers we have been using will be phased out soon. Very soon if not already!

EFN's goal is to provide Internet access to all of our community at a reasonable cost, or at no cost to those who meet certain guidelines. They are doing this, but it is up to us to have the necessary computing equipment that will "mesh" with their's.

In this light, they are offering computers on a "loan" basis to those who presently do not have computers capable of meeting their minimum standards. Give them a call if you feel you qualify for this service.

300 and 1200 baud is pretty slow by today's standards; actually these speeds are slow by standards from 10 years ago! Few, if any, Internet Service Providers still have equipment that can operate at such speeds. Give us a call if you are in this situation!

Quirky Keyboard

This is the term we heard over the summer when an e-mailer was asking about Junior's "enhanced" keyboard. Well, this isn't our term for the cordless, 15 years-ahead-of-its-time keyboard. . .that's STILL working.



Junior's keyboard is very unique even if it is somewhat "quirky." Using four penlight batteries, you can key in documents while you sit on the sofa or easy chair a long way from your Junior. All you need do is keep the "magic eyes" lined up with the little hole in the front of Junior.

About the only keyboard on the market that has ever had a neoprene safety shield built into it, spills onto Junior's keyboard, while bad, are not devastating like they would be with other keyboards. You can take Junior's keyboard apart and not only remove the dust, but you can wash it!

Using the keyboard cord, you can keep right on keying without batteries. Your only limitations here are the length of cord you have. You no longer have to keep the keyboard in line with the IR sensor on the front of Jr.

Still, many Junior users prefer to use larger more standard keyboards. You can do this by purchasing the Keytronic KB5151jr keyboard that plugs into Junior's K connector. While this keyboard was pretty spendy when they were first manufactured, they are well within everyone's budget now.

Other keyboards require an adapter of some sort. Only XT-type keyboards will work with Junior, but there were several adapters made to modify these keyboards for Junior use.


One such adapter was a unit made by Synectics Software and Systems that replaced the IR sensor in Junior's case. It had a little jumper that attached to one of Junior's chips, but other than that, was very easy to use.

Another was made by RACORE and this adapter had a two-way plug that attached to the K and LP ports on the back of Junior. If you had socket protectors on your Junior (and everyone should), you had to break out the spacer between the two sockets, but it was well worth it. The RACORE adapter allowed both the original Junior keyboard and any XT-type keyboard to be used simultaneously.

Large keyboards are nice if you do a lot of keyboarding. They are nice if you are into number crunching and know a numeric keypad well so you can just turn the "num-lock" on.

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But, the Junior keyboard is nice, too. The function keys work like the template says they do with the Assistant series. The size is perfect! Of course WordPerfect's "home, home, up" keystroke is somewhat difficult! It becomes "function home, function home, up."

The Eugene PCjr Club publishes its "Newsletter" as part of its many functions as a computer club. It doesn't publish it to make a profit. Actually, the newsletter is the club's greatest expense item. As long as the club's funds hold out the newsletter will be around.

The term "your club" is a little misleading as most of our members feel it is "our club." I'm just the newsletter editor who is answering some of the e-mail so it isn't "my" club. It is a not for profit computer club and as such doesn't "belong" to anyone.

As no one "owns" the club, no one person can say "close it" or that could merge us with another club. While I am sure many of our members belong to other computer clubs, the Eugene PCjr Club's membership is very
