GRAPHX - MENU COLORS

Have you ever gotten irritated with the way GRAPHX menus indicate your choice. The lack of distinct contrast makes it difficult to see just which choice you have made. Now there is a way to change that.

I have come across three different groups of files for GRAPHX. Hopefully, yours will fit into one of the groups I have found. You will need a sector editor, such as Disk Utilities by John Birdwell.

After loading your sector editor, follow the instructions

for the group of files you have.

If you have PROGRAM files called GRAPHX1 and GRAPHX2, search in GRAPHX1 for >02071F, 1F is the colors (1=black, F=white). Change 1F to your desired combination (FC will give you a reverse video of the menu).

You may have D/F 80 files called PARTA, PARTB, etc. or PART1, PART2, etc. In this case look for >0207421F. Again the 1F is black letters on white. To get white on green you need to replace the 1F with FC.

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THE 'BIG PICTURE'

Virtually every aspect of intellectual need can be satisfied via your TI99/4A keyboard, your home telephone, and a modem.

Need info on the right way to build a shed, cook Peking Duck, plant orchids, cast sculpture... call your local library BBS from your home computer!

Need info on the migration of "killer bees" from South America... call the Library of Congress via DIALOG BBS!

What impact will all this have on the children of the future. provided that the spark is kindled, the fuel supply is infinite and the access unlimited. The children will usher in the Fifth age and we will all live to see it.

As our geographical and sociological barriers continue to dissolve in the process of reaching out to one another with this medium... the world as we know it will change beyond recognition... for the betterment of mankind.

So how and where do you jump on this bandwagon? Modems can be had for as little as \$ 25.00 for a TI, the local Bulletin Board System(s) are FREE.

Don't have a modem you say ?

What's YOUR excuse ?

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WHAT IS IT ?

Support of course. Not just technical help but real "people support".

How many times have you needed help with some computer oriented question at a time when no one was around? Like 3AM in the morning or on a holiday?

And how many of you fellow SouthWest 99ers out there who seldom attend meetings feel left out 7

Keep in mind that 24 hours a day and seven days a week there is a number you can call that will provide you with more help than you can imagine... no matter what kind of help you need, even if it has nothing to do with computers.

The number is 795-1953. It is the number for The Cactus Patch Bulletin Board System sponsored by the SW99ers.

Modems can be had for as little as \$25 dollars so there's no excuse for not having one. Help with cables (if needed) and software is readily available through the group.

IF YOU HAVE NEVER EXPLORED A TI OR GENEVE ORIENTED BULLETIN BOARD SYSTEM SUCH AS OURS YOU ARE MISSING OUT COMPLETELY ON THE BEST REASON TO OWN A TI OR GENEVE COMPUTER. PEOPLE SUPPORT.

Sure, a TI is CHEAP... and many of you feel THAT is the best reason to have one, but you're wrong.

Granted, joining the group was an effort aimed at solving the need for support, but I wouldn't advise calling any of the members at 3 AM!

Beyond that, having a modem not only gives you constant access to the group at all times, it provides you with a means of accessing WORLDS of information on ANYTHING! Other bulletin board systems in libraries, government agencies, hospitals, businesses, and OTHER TI SUPPORT GROUPS WORLDWIDE each have something to offer YOU as a telecommunicator.

Telecommunications (TC for short) is the most fantastic thing that you could ever experience with your computer.

Think you have a neat system now? Try hooking up to a 200 MEG system using your keyboard and telephone !!!

Or if you think that's passe try hooking up with the Library of Congress BBS! You could spend a lifetime just getting used to PART of the system.

Returning to Earth for a moment... there are THOUSANDS (perhaps millions) of FREE programs designed for use with YOUR system that are waiting for YOU to get a modem and download them by phone.

If that's not enough, there is one more reason to have a modem that I feel from experience is THE most important reason and that is ELECTRONIC MAIL. "E-Mail".

Once you've "logged on" to a BBS once or twice, there are questions you ARE going to have that you can enter into a Message Base and address to the System Operator or to "ALL" or to any other user.

The warmth and abundance of the responses WILL amaze you, as suddenly the cold machine you have hooked up to COMES ALIVE with real people leaving you friendly and VERY helpful mail.

Leave a message to anyone and call again in a few hours or the next day. It doesn't take long for new users to get swamped with mail from other users of the board. They "draw you in"!

Most boards do offer you the option of making your messages to others private, but unless there is a good reason to do so you will usually get suprisingly good results by letting anyone view and respond to your messages.

You can also read messages intended for others and leap into the conversation by leaving THEM unexpected mail!

One rule of thumb though, if you have nothing good to say, say nothing!

These folks are YOUR NEW EXTENDED FAMILY, and you'll soon feel right at home with them and they with YOU.

(Besides... they understand your computer involvement better than any spouse!) (grin)

The Cactus Patch BBS here in Tucson has one problem that seems to be extremely unusual as far as TI/Geneve boards goes here in the United States... the problem is that most of the members of Southwest Ninety-Niners (its sponsor) have no modems!

This is INSANE.

The Cactus Patch not only offers YOU more great FREE programs than you could ever find time to use, it offers YOU an electronic mailbox that you can use ANYTIME for immediate help on hardware or software difficulties, purchase decisions, roofing decisions (ask R.S.! <GRIN)),

After all the church activities are finished, Jack and BJ turn their attention to the User Group activities. BJ is the SW99er Newsletter Editor, which is a very big job. Jack and BJ serve as co-chairman of the SW99ers library committee. And, BJ, as you all know, is the group's President! And now to add more to her schedule, she is on the Pest West '90 committee.

As to the systems, Jack and BJ and their sons are never at a loss for a computer to use. They have two fully expanded TI-99/4Å systems (one is BJ's and the other is the boys' computer) and a fully expanded Geneve (for Jack). All the systems operate with DSDD drives. BJ's systems and Jack's system each have a printer. BJ uses a NX-1000 while Jack uses the old reliable TI impact printer. BJ also has a Horizon randisk and a modem on her system. It is a rare moment when one or more of the systems is not up and running.

Resides the activities mentioned earlier. Jack and BJ use their systems for such diverse activities as graphics. telecommunicating, games (once in a while), learning assembly language (Jack, that is), modifying and writing programs, etc., etc... Jack and BJ have released on a fairware basis, TIMP PRINT, which allows printer commands to be incorporated into Multiplan spreadsheets. They have also released to public domain an educational program to teach preschoolers their colors and a BlackJack program for up to 5 players. Jack has also modified DM-1000 (his version is called DM-1000jml) and these enhancements will hopefully be included in the next release of DM-1000 by the Ottawa Users Group. Jack has sent his enhancements to them twice, but they say they haven't seen it. He hasn't sent them the latest enhancements, he keeps finding something else to change and doesn't want to send it until it is complete.

When BJ finds the time (what is left of it!), she likes doing crafts, such as sewing, crocheting, macrame'ing, etc. She also gardens, and enjoys reading. Plus, she is taking a phonics class on Saturday's this fall at BCMS.

Jack, in his spare time tinkers with electronics, and

likes(???) to fix up things around the house. Both Jack and BJ have even done some remodeling in their own home as well as several other homes. Jack and BJ are two of the busiest people I know. And thanks to the efforts of BJ, the SouthWest Ninety Niners User Group is the success story that it is.

SWAN'S POND

Finally, I am seeing our Geneve 9640 computer looking more and more like a DOS machine. True, it isn't a DOS machine yet, but thanks to Paul Charlton and Jerry Coffey, plus a number of other authors, I am able to run most of the programs I like to use straight out of MDOS.

Paul Charlton has provided us with a program called EXEC which executes many of my favorite EA5 programs right from DOS. It was inconvenient to use the EXEC, or should I say I prefered some other method than pointing to my harddisk directory, then typing in E:EXEC P:PROGNAME. E being my Horizon ramdisk, and P being my harddisk.

Then I came across a file put together by Jerry Coffey. It contained batch files to point to the directory I wanted, and and execute my favorite programs. To show what I mean, following in my MDOS menu:

As you see, with a few exceptions, I have no real reason to enter the GPL mode at all! If I want to use Telco, I type in "1" and press enter. The file "1" is then excuted. Following is "1":

CD \TC First of all, I point myself the the root

directory WDS1.TC.

EXEC TELCO Then execute Telco with using the EXEC

program, also on TC.

CD \DOSPGM When I am finished, I point back to my

WDS1, DOSPGM directory.

M I then execute "M" which displays my MDOS

Main Menu.





Pollowing is the file "M":

ECHO OFF I turn the echo off, just in case.

CLS I then clear the screen.

WINDOW Window is executed (more on this later).

TYPE BOOTH The MDOS Main Menu is displayed within the

window.

So, what in effect is happening is, I select from MDOS the EA5 program I wish to execute. I have the corresponding file set up to point to the sub-directory I want, then I execute EXEC (which I have included in each sub-directory that I feel will get a lot of use). EXEC TELCO causes Telco to be loaded in and executed. When I exit Telco, the batch file continues executing. This way I can point myself back to my root directory WDS1.DOSPGM and reload my menu screen.

Included in Jerry Coffeys file, GMENU6, which is available on all major boards, is a AUTOEXEC, some executable EA5 programs, a DOS menu of Jerry's design, and the necessary "files" needed to execute his examples. Plus, the is one program included that I really like, and that is WINDOW. It sets up a window on the screen, and all the action then takes place within this window. Granted, it is a crude window, but I'm sure we'll be seeing improvements in this whole MDOS menu system coming out on a regular basis in the near future.

And I expect to be seeing ways of executing Extended Basic and GPL programs right out of MDOS before much longer also. We have a good number of very sharp Geneve users out there, and they are always looking for ways to better use this machine. And I have faith that they will do it. We TI'ers are a resourceful bunch of computer users.

One thing that makes GMENU6 so exciting is its ease of customization. I changed Jerry's sample AUTOEXEC, menu, sub files, etc to work on my system. It should be noted that GMENU6 works best with a Horizon ramdisk or a hard disk. I am very excited by these newest of advances, and hope it continues.


